

We believe this painting tells the Mojave transportation story from the railroad that established Mojave in 1876; the 20-Mule-Team that carried



borax 165-miles, from Death Valley to the railhead in Mojave from 1883 to 1889; the Corsairs that flew from USMC Air Station Mojave during World War II; the truck traffic on the two major highways, SR-58 and SR-14; all the way up to the flying machines, designed by Burt Rutan, White Knight One and SpaceShipOne! A picture truly is worth a thousand words!

Al Hansen's Canadair Mk-VI Sabre or F-86E is very photogenic and aviation photographers seem to like to capture artsy shots of the Korean War era fighter jet.

The North American F-86
Sabre was a trusted fighter.
Its reputation as a MiG
