Another great Plane Crazy Saturday! Aviation Author Jonna Doolittle Hoppes and her cousin, Jimmy Doolittle, III gave an up close and personal glimpse of their famous grandfather, Army Air Corps

aviator General Jimmy Doolittle. "He was best known for leading the Tokyo Raid," said Jonna. "But the raid was not what he felt was his most important achievement. He firmly believed that his experiments, especially in blind flight, were his greatest contributions to aviation."

Jonna's first book, *Calculated Risk: The Extraordinary Life of Jimmy Doolittle*, is a memoir of her famous grandfather, aviator Jimmy Doolittle, and his equally extraordinary wife, Joe.

Josephine Daniels was an "A" student in school with an analytical mind, and her mother expected her to marry well. In high school, she



fell for Jimmy Doolittle, a young man who boxed for spending money and followed his father to Nome, Alaska, to find gold. Joe's parents were not happy with Doolittle!



"Joe" gambled early on a boy who boxed for spending money and fancied finding gold on the beaches of Alaska. She traipsed around the country, pulling up stakes and replanting them every time Jimmy's career led them in a new direction. Never once did she stand in his way. Jonna explained that the book was just as much about her grandmother Joe, as is was about, the legendary aviator.

No stranger to Mojave Airport, Jimmy Doolittle, III,

retired Air Force colonel, who served in Vietnam flying A-1 Skyraiders and was Vice Commander of the Air Force Flight Test Center at Edwards Air Force Base, delighted the crowd with flying stories. Our own history making aviator, Dick Rutan, retired USAF Lt. Colonel, MISTY pilot, combat Veteran of Vietnam, added to the conversation with questions for Doolittle, III.

Jonna completely sold out of her books and made three trips back to her car to get more books, until the last one was gone!

Bill Deaver took many photos of Jonna's presentation in the EKAD Board Room and even captured some of the early day photos of General Doolittle.

Wen Painter was on hand to sign the aircraft tax exempt forms for pilots displaying their aircraft at Plane Crazy Saturday. "We had twenty-five aircraft sign in, even though the weather was so chancy," said Painter.
